Significant new reforms are on the horizon for Algeria's universities. Efforts are being made to ratchet up public funding and raise standards, with the government planning to spend US\$1.48 billion on higher education and science over the next five years and to double research spending to 1% of gross domestic product.

# Libyan Scholarship Program

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## Background

- •Scholarships funded by Ministry of Higher Education. Most are graduate students, many in STEM fields.
- Students are managed by Canadian Bureau for International Education.
- Provide all costs of degree study.
- Provide English language study when necessary.
- •Most students require conditional admission, as they do not have standardized test scores.



# Background

- •Students must find their own admission to universities, and they are not familiar with U.S. universities or our admission procedures.
- First U.S. universities fairs in 30 years held in Tripoli and Benghazi in October 2010.
- •EducationUSA advisor in U.S. Embassy, Tripoli.



# Current Status of Libyan Students in U.S.

 About 2000 Libyan scholarship students currently in U.S., managed by CBIE

 Another 200 nominees are still in Libya in process of applying to universities.



### Projections for next 2 years

• During recent visit to Libya, CBIE senior management learned that a project is being proposed to Council of Ministers to send 5000 students worldwide – including undergraduates.



### Current issues

2012 Conference

- Standardized tests: TOEFL PBT in Benghazi and Tripoli – March and May 2012
- IELTS will be offered in March 2012
- No visas yet in Tripoli all visas through Tunis or Cairo
- No bank transfers overseas yet, should improve
- Internet/email/urban phones work well
- Applications are resuming to U.S. universities, but without test scores
- Difficulty in obtaining official transcripts



## Recruitment strategies

- Work with your current Libyan students
- Post a brief description of your university on CBIE Libyan Facebook page
- If you have any contacts from 2010, renew them (potential students, university professors, etc.)
- Linden Tours is trying to set up fall visit to Libya. An organized tour is the best way to reach students.
