

# Higher Education Challenges & Opportunities in a Post-Quake Haiti

#### Main Academic Higher Education Institutions BQ

The State University of Haiti (UEH), 11 faculties spread in different sites, a total of 25 000 students.

Four Public Institutions (Pul) operating in the provinces.

200 so called Private higher education Institutions (PrI). Only 47 of them are accredited by the Ministry of Education.

1xUEH + 4xPuI + 8xPrI = Agence Universitaire de la Francophonie (AUF) Network in Haiti > 60% of the total Haitian student population



# The AQ (After quake) period: What has changed?

The political and the international actors understand the urgency to be proactive at both ends of the educational pipeline and not only at the beginning end.

- Almost total destruction of infrastructures
- Lack of experts to resolve the main problems
- Some will to help with funding

Stakeholders today understand better that without a local education system to train high-level scientific experts, Haiti's vulnerability to catastrophes will tend to remain the same

(200 prof., 6,000 students dead – Many students and professors living under tents)

# UMB-INAGHEI partnership focuses on :

#### State of INAGHEI

- One of 11 faculties of the State University of Haiti
- Established in 1973 with Canadian assistance
- Offers undergraduate degrees in business administration, accounting, public administration, political science, and international studies





- Overcrowded classes
- Limited access to classroom materials textbooks
- Lack of full-time faculty
- Unavailability of professors to supervise student research
- Lack of faculty research






#### INAGHEI after January 12, 2010

- Classrooms damaged but repairable
- Library damaged and unusable
- Computer lab destroyed
- Administrative structure severely weaken

# Rebuilding and Improving Higher Education in Haiti

The higher education system, which faced numerous structural challenges prior to the earthquake, collapsed.

- 87% of 131 HEI in PAP metro area completely or partially destroyed.
- 9 of 13 buildings of the State University of Haiti (UEH) partially or completely destroyed



## ATEA Higher Education Consortium Meeting October 26-27, 2010

- Establishing agreement among the participants on certain broad principles for supporting the improvement and rebuilding of higher education in Haiti.
- Identifying specific longterm activities that individual members of the consortium can undertake within the next 2-5 years.

- Identifying specific short-term activities that individual members of the consortium of colleges and universities can undertake within the next 6-18 months.
- Getting agreement to create an advisory council of senior level university administrators to oversee the activities of the consortium.

# Higher Education Consortium Problems: **Governance and Structure**

#### Short Term

· A lack of regulations and policy

#### Long Term

- The proliferation of private for-profit universities
- The absence of a system for accreditation

#### Short & Long Term

- Confusion about the role of public universities in a democracy
- Government resources to support public higher education in Haiti is insufficient



# Higher Education Consortium Problems: **Resources**

#### **Short Term**

- Inadequate ICT, labs and library resources
- · Lack of regular student access to faculty for advising and learning
- · Lack of data to determine the real needs of the higher education system
- · Absence of logistical arrangements for faculty exchange

- · Lack of access to permanent physical space
- · Shortage of qualified teachers
- · Brain drain
- · Inadequate funding
- · Lack of teacher preparation and professional development
- · Too few institutions of higher education outside of the three major cities
- Inadequate financial resources for students

 Absence of communication and coordination between the institutions of higher education




