UN Women's Egypt country office has produced a new public service announcement through its "Safe Cities: Free from Violence against Women and Girls" project to highlight threats and unwanted advances impact Egyptian women and girls. Aimed at raising awareness among both women and men, the PSA is filmed as a direct invitation to men and boys to put themselves in women's place and to stop blaming them for sexual harassment under that very slogan: "Put yourself in her shoes, instead of finding ways to blame her!"

### Looking back, a year later

- "I'd get stares for talking loud, for eating fast... I felt pressured into being cutesy. I like cute things, sure. But there's so much more to women, and I think a lot of the girls studying with me forgot that."
- I was hit on quite a bit at my internship in Germany, and it wasn't uncommon for an older man to comment on my physical appearance. I can't compare US and German offices, because I haven't worked in an office in the U.S. It seemed culturally acceptable to comment on one's co-workers' looks, but I was uncomfortable and peeved."
- "The immediate conversation starter or assumptions or curiosities were not about me but rather whether or not I 'had a man.' Questions about husbands, marriage, and family were on the introductory level for women and not men. Every time."

## Ideals and realities...









- "One of my professors is taking the next two weeks off for paternity leave. I've never heard of a father doing that back home."
- "Gender is much more delineated in China. Most of the time, girls spend time with girls and boys spend time with boys. "
- "In Morocco, women and men usually are not friends, although sometimes they can be. In America, women often have male friends."
- "In a class in Japan we did an entire unit on "should women be housewives or have careers?" That's not even a question herewomen know they can do anything they want. "
