Faculty's Critical Role

- Teaching & Curriculum
- Research
- Institutional Impact



Teaching & Curriculum

Influence students & shape future generations of leaders and scholars

Faculty teach 17.6 million students

- Faculty with international experience
 - Gain enhanced teaching skills
 - Develop new courses or introduce new course content



Research & Knowledge Building

Translate and disseminate new knowledge to the public and private sectors

- Faculty that go abroad
 - Gain new perspective on their discipline and scholarship
 - Initiate new projects or move their research in new directions



Institutional Impact

- Inspire students to study abroad
- Attract international students and scholars
- Network with colleagues abroad and initiate collaborative research projects
- Establish or lay groundwork for exchange partnerships with institutions worldwide



Share information about host country with colleagues & students	99%
Recommend that faculty colleagues apply for a Fulbright	91%
Recommend other international experiences	85%
Become more aware of and sensitive to cultural diversity	85%
Encourage students to study abroad	80%
Incorporate their Fulbright experience into curricula or teaching methods	73%
Share information with their host country with community groups	72%

ATEA Providing Incentives – Show that International **Engagement Counts**

- Annual Reviews, Merit, Promotion & **Tenure of Faculty**
- Local Retention of Faculty Salary Savings
- College/Department Merit Pool Allocations
- College/Department Research and Teaching Allocations
- College Dean & Department Chair Reviews



Addressing the Disincentives Deal with Reasons Why Faculty Decline International Engagement

- Assign responsibility to facilitate international engagement to Key Administrative Officer
- Facilitate the Retention of Benefits During International/Fulbright Appointments
- Include International Engagement in Policies on Personnel and Unit Reviews
- Indicate a willingness to craft special agreements and support for faculty engaged in international activities



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


The Five I's of Faculty Engagement in Internationalization

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Intentionality

- Rationales
- Goals
- Resources
- Connections to Disciplinary Priorities



Intentionality

- Develop internationalization plan
- Develop faculty engagement strategies
- Ask the following questions:
 - What are the goals & resources for faculty involvement?
 - What central units and subunits are responsible for faculty engagement?



Intentionality

- Is internationalization a priority articulated in the institution's strategic plan?
 - Encourage deans to integrate internationalization into schools' strategic plans



Investments

- Assess current funding
 - How might funds be reallocated to increase faculty engagement in internationalization?
- Differentially invest funds
 - Strategically allocate various types and amounts of funds throughout the institution
 - so that ownership and implementation of strategies are dispersed in all corners of the institution



Infrastructure

- Examine current infrastructure
 - international centers
 - degree programs
 - seminars
 - institutional partnerships
 - overseas campuses
 - timing & locations of programs/resources
 - deliverables



Institutional Networks

- Assess internal and external networks
 - Investigate opportunities for collaboration
 - within the institution
 - with neighboring institutions
 - with overseas institutions

Institutional Networks

- Strategically use technology
 - Electronic databases
 - Electronic surveys
 - Strategic emails
 - International videoconferencing



Institutional Networks

• Streamline international resources for faculty in a central location on institution's website



Institutional Networks

- Internationalization Committee
 - Does the committee have the *authority* and *resources* to oversee implementation of the internationalization plan?
 - If not, provosts should charge a high-level, interdisciplinary faculty group
 - with the power to implement the internationalization plan, including creating faculty engagement strategies
 - i.e. Council on International Teaching and Research



Individual Support

• Evaluate the types of support faculty have to connect their scholarship with the internationalization plan



Individual Support

- Key Tenet:
 - Disciplinary departments serve as the epicenter of faculty involvement.
- What strategies can be developed to connect internationalization goals with individual department & faculty agendas?
- For institutions with internationalization plans,
 - Discuss with presidents & provosts the value of requesting deans to integrate internationalization into their school's strategic plan.
